I still don't have much concrete news on the planned improvements to the Sports Center tennis court lighting but the "latest" falls under the category of good news/bad news. The work was put out for bid mid-August and the best guess at this point is that work could start mid-October. The expectation is that work can be done so that some courts will be usable at all times (although there may be some noise and dust). The bad news is we may need to find other courts for USTA play for a couple of months. The decision on just how to implement the improvement plan is up in the air until a contractor is selected. Of course, no matter whether it is USTA or recreational play, court availability will be impacted to some degree until the work is completed. The Sports Center is currently helping us identify potential alternative sites so that we can limit the problems that fewer available courts will cause.

If you haven't heard, the USTA moved the start of the Mixed League season. Instead of starting in September along with the Senior Leagues, Mixed leagues will begin play in January. This should help with any court scheduling challenges that stem from the lighting improvement work.

You may have heard about a medical emergency that occurred following one of our recent matches. Thankfully, someone was there who had just finished taking a CPR class and knew what to do. She was a hero for sure. There are some things about the incident that are worth mentioning. (Continued on page 2)

Time is critical so use a landline at the front desk to get the quickest response. Second, remember that the Sports Center has a defibrillator (on the wall outside the upstairs rest

rooms) and the CSC staff members are trained to use it. Third, if you haven't taken a CPR class, you should give it serious consideration. A small investment of your time could save a life.
